"The bark beetles' destruction spread across 524,000 new acres in Colorado and Wyoming last year, much of which was in Larimer County, as the beetles began to heavily infest forests east of the Continental Divide." – Fort Collins Coloradoan Jan, 23, 2010

- Each infested tree that is cut and treated will save 4 or more healthy trees from becoming infested next year.
- The lower the fuel loads in your forest, the smaller and less intense the next wildfire is likely to become.

Unfortunately the pine beetles are flying again and much more will need to be done. It is plain to see that many of you are already overwhelmed and simply can't do more by yourselves. Others don't know what to do and are simply hoping that things won't get too much worse. A quick trip to the site of the "Bobcat Gulch" fire of ten years ago should confirm that things can get much worse and stay that way for decades. We need to get more people involved before the next wildfire starts here!
